

Episode 29: 本を読んだり

hon o yondari – (do things like) read books

## B, 本を読んだり、昼寝をしたりしました。

A. kinou wa, nani o shimashita ka?

B. hon o yondari hirune o shitari shimashita.

as for yesterday, what - did?

book - (direct object marker) - things like reading - nap - (direct object marker) - things like doing (nap) - did

A. What did you do yesterday?

B. I did things like reading a book and taking a nap and so on.

## VOCABULARY

•  $\mathcal{EOSIC}$  (yesterday);  $\mathcal{EOSIC}$  (vesterday);  $\mathcal{EOSIC}$  (contrast marker; adding an emphasis on "yesterday". This  $\mathcal{EOSIC}$  is not necessary to be here grammar wise, but it sets "a stage" for the rest of the sentence. Since "time" and "location" come before a verb and sometimes before a topic or a subject in Japanese,  $\mathcal{E}$  (as for) can attach to "time" or "location" for adding emphasis, and doing so, it sets a "stage" for the rest of the sentence. This way of using  $\mathcal{E}$  sort of creates a nice rhythm in a sentence as well.)]

• 何を what [何 (what); を (direct object marker; 何 is the direct object for the verb: しました)]

- しましたか? did (you) do? [しました polite past of する (to do); か (question marker)]
- •本book

• 読んだり (things like) reading a book or ... [読ん from 読む (to read); だり (and/ or; a particle that is used to list an example out of multiple situations; "doing things like~ and/ or...";

it's たり but it becomes だり depending on how the verb conjugates to the past form; construction of たり: conjugate the verb into simple past and add り after it. (読む→読んだ→ 読んだり); note: たり itself doesn't have a sense of time, even though it uses the past form in the construction]

• 昼寝 nap; afternoon nap [昼 (noon) + 寝 (sleep)]

• (昼寝を)したりしました I did thigs like (taking a nap) [(昼寝を)し from (昼寝を)する (to take a nap); たり (things like ~); しました from する (to do); たり is used in the form of "~し たりする" (to do things like ~ing) and often used when nesting multiple items as in this case; "~ たり、~たりする" (to do things like ~ing or ~ing); たり could also be translated as "and so on," "and so forth," "or something like that," or "and things like that."]
